





Attendance Policy

Being present in school is essential for students to make academic progress. The objective of the district's comprehensive attendance policy is to promote student attendance and identify the process used to address issues related to unexcused absences, incidents of tardiness and early departures. Communication about attendance expectations and addressing attendance issues is an important part of the policy.

In general, the following types of absences, incidents of tardiness or early departures are considered excused: personal illness, serious illness or death in the family, religious observance, quarantine, court appearances, attendance at health clinics, approved cooperative work programs and other specific circumstances noted in our Board Policy 7006.

In general, the following types of

absences, incidents of tardiness or early departures are considered unexcused: vacationing, shopping, babysitting, oversleeping or missing the bus.

The district will notify parents/guardians when unexcused attendance issues reach specific thresholds identified in policy. This notification includes notification when 10 absences are reached in a full-year course or five absences are reached for a half-year course. A student with more than seven unexcused absences for a half-credit course or 15 unexcused absences for a full-credit course may not receive credit for that course. Students taking College Now or dual enrollment classes must meet the college's attendance requirements in order to obtain college credit for the course.

On days school is in session, a studentathlete must report to school no later than 12:30 pm on the day of his/her athletic game or extracurricular event in order to participate. If the student-athlete is present for at least two hours before 12:30 pm, and then is legally excused, the student may participate in the day's contest.

To support attendance and access to instructional content, the district utilizes systems to acknowledge a student's efforts to maintain or improve school attendance.

Health & Wellness and Safety Notifications

Body Mass Index Reporting

New York state requires schools to track each student's body mass index (BMI) and weight status category as part of school health examinations. Every year, the New York State Department of Health surveys some schools for the number of students in each weight-status category. This year, we will be surveyed by the state, but the district will share summary group data only and will not share summary group calculations. In order to opt out of the sharing of this data, parents/guardians must contact the health office and speak with the nurse.

Continuity of Operations Plan

New York state requires school districts to develop a continuity of operations plan and make it available. Interested stakeholders who wish to review the plan and are aware of the district's plans in the event of an ongoing public health emergency involving communicable disease may contact the district office, as the plan is incorporated into our school safety plan.

Hand Sanitizer Use

Our district makes alcohol-based hand sanitizers available in its school buildings. If parents/guardians wish to opt their child out of using it, they should send a written notice to the school. Correspondence should be sent to the building principal and teachers who work with your child.

Influenza Awareness

Schools are required to post influenza educational materials in plain view within their facilities. The materials must be posted during flu season but may be permanently displayed "to ensure families receive information on influenza and the benefits of influenza immunizations in connection with efforts to raise the immunity of children against influenza."



School Safety Plan

As required by state education law, the district maintains a district-wide safety plan and must post this plan on its website. This plan is designed to prevent or minimize the effects of violent incidents and emergencies and to facilitate the coordination of schools and school districts with local and county resources in the event of such incidents or emergencies.

HEALTH & WELLNESS AND SAFETY NOTIFICATIONS

Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention

The purpose of the Dominic Murray Sudden Cardiac Arrest Prevention Act is to promote safe interscholastic athletics participation and to prevent incidents of Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) in student



athletes. The law requires districts to provide information to parents/guardians of student athletes prior to the student's participation in any interscholastic athletics. The law also requires teachers who coach extra-class athletic activity and coaches to hold a valid certificate of completion of a first aid knowledge and skills course offered by a nationally recognized organization. Health Information Privacy

Patient health care records maintained by schools are considered education records and are thus subject to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) rules, and not the privacy portions of HIPAA. When a school wants or needs health information from outside health care providers, schools will need to adhere to the disclosure requirements of the outside health care providers (which are HIPAA - governed) in order to gain access to the information.

Student Privacy

Ed Law 2D

New York State Education Law gives you the right to information about how the district is safeguarding student and staff data. Read our "Parents Rights for Data" (Parents' Bill of Rights) located on our website under the "Student/Parent" heading.



If at any time the district learns that student and/or employee data has been compromised, parents/guardians will be notified, and the data breach will be reported to the state Education Department. Parents/guardians who have concerns or complaints about data privacy or security may file a complaint by contacting the superintendent and data protection officer, 315-826-0203.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) provides parents/ guardians and students who are 18 years of age or older (known as "eligible students") with certain rights with respect to the student's education records.

Parents/guardians and eligible students have the right to:

 Know the current contact person: Laura Dutton, Superintendent (If the designee for inquiries changes, the named point of contact will be able to provide this information);

- Inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days after the day a request for access is received by the school. These requests should be submitted to Laura Dutton, 315-826-0203;
- Request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent/ guardian or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights;
- Provide written consent before the school discloses personally identifiable information from the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent;
- File a complaint with the USDOE concerning alleged failures by the district to comply with requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA are: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue SW, Washington, DC20202.

Freedom of Information Law

Military Recruiters' & Institutes of Higher Education's Access to Student Information

Pursuant to federal law, the district must provide to military recruiters and institutions of higher education, upon request, the names, addresses and telephone numbers of high school students. Parents/guardians or students aged 18 or older who do not want this information released to military recruiters and/or institutes of higher education should contact the district guidance director at 315-826-0200.

Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment

The Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment

provides parents/guardians with certain rights regarding the conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes and certain physical exams. In particular, if a survey is funded in whole or part by the U.S. Department of Education, parents/guardians have the right to consent before students are



required to complete a survey that asks about any of the following protected areas:

- Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parents/guardians;
- Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
- Sexual behavior or attitudes;
- Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating or demeaning behavior;
- Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
- Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors or ministers;
- Religious practices, affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent/ guardian; or
- Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.

Release of Student Directory Information

Consistent with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the district has designated certain categories of personally identifiable student information that it may release without prior written consent. This is known as "directory information." The purpose of doing this is to enable student activities and accomplishments to be publicized and for the creation of such publications



as the annual yearbook, programs for graduations, concerts and other special events, sports activity sheets and honor roll or recognition lists. Achievements are typically published on the school website and through school district social media, press releases to the local media and official district publications. Directory information can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent/guardian's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks.

If you do not want any or all of these types of information pertaining to your child released without your prior written consent, please send this request in writing to Laura Dutton, School Records Officer, by Oct. 15, 2023.

While the district will honor the request of any parent/guardian or eligible student who has submitted written notification opting their child out of the release of directory information, the district is not responsible for media that cover news

happenings, sporting events or other school events that are open to the public, such as plays and musical performances.

Fiduciary and Budgetary Notices

ARP ESSER Fund Reporting

The district has received a federal coronavirus relief package through the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act.

School Budget Documents

New York State Education Law requires school districts to provide a detailed statement of the amount of money which will be required for the ensuing year for school purposes, specifying the several purposes and the amount for each.

The required budget documents include the budget statement, the proposed budget in three-part format separated into three components (administration, program and capital), prepared in plain language; the property tax report card; school (New York State-developed) academic report cards, the district's fiscal accountability summary; salary disclosure requirements, and exemption reporting for taxing jurisdictions.

Title I Funding

The district receives Title I funding under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

Parents have a right to know and request the professional qualifications of their child's classroom teachers. Districts are also required to provide assessment results and assessment information. Notification requirements include:

- Whether a teacher has state certification for the grade levels and subjects he or she is teaching;
- Whether a teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived;
- Whether the teacher is teaching in the field of discipline of the certification of the teacher;
- Whether their child receives services from paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications; and
- Whether their child has been taught for four or more weeks in a row by a teacher "who does not meet applicable state certification or licensure requirements at the grade level and subject area in which the teacher has been assigned."

Information for parents/guardians on the level of achievement and academic growth of the student, and if applicable and available, on each of the required state academic assessments.

Decisions about student promotion and placement are at the final discretion of the administration. These decisions are guided by recommendations of principals, teachers and staff members, past academic performance and parent/guardian input. Past academic performance refers to a variety of

indicators of student achievement and growth. The district's promotion and placement policy was adopted by the Board of Education following a review by the district administration and is available using our online board policy book.

As required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the district maintains asbestos management plans for district buildings. The plans are on file in the District Office and Business Office and are available for review during normal business hours. As required, periodic surveys are

conducted every six months. Currently, there are no projects scheduled that will disturb asbestos-containing building material.

Integrated Pest Management

New York State Education Law requires schools to provide written notification to all parents/guardians and staff members regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year. The district maintains a list of all individuals who wish to receive 48hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. If you would like to receive 48-hour notifications of pesticide applications that are scheduled to occur, please contact the Business Office. In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list. Some pesticide applications are not subject to notification requirements,

including anti-microbial products, EPA-designated biopesticides and exempt materials, and when a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application.

Lead Testing

State law requires school districts to sample all water outlets currently or potentially used for drinking or cooking purposes in buildings that may be occupied by students and to submit those samples to a state-approved lab for analysis. Testing last took place in 2020 and must be completed every three years thereafter, unless the state commissioner of health requires testing sooner. The state established an action level of 0.005 milligrams of lead per liter. If a sample from a water outlet exceeds this level, schools must take steps to prevent the use of the outlet for drinking or cooking

purposes until it is remediated and followup testing confirms it is no longer above the action level. School districts are required to report the results of all water testing to the state Department of Health, the state Education Department and the local health department, and to post the results on the district website. The Board of Education must annually review and update, if necessary, the code of conduct. Presentations about changes occur during posted board meetings and allow the opportunity for participation by school personnel, students, parents/guardians and any other interested parties.

Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR): Obtaining Teacher/ Principal APPR Scores

New York State Education Law requires each classroom teacher and school principal to receive an annual professional performance review (APPR) that results in a composite effectiveness score and rating. All parents/guardians have the right to obtain the APPR quality ratings and composite effectiveness scores for their child's current teacher(s) and principal(s) once they are available. School Meals

The Child Nutrition Programs are operated in each building by the OHM BOCES School Food Service Team. We are pleased to announce that in the 2023-2024 School Year, we will be operating under the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)meaning all meals are FREE to all students! The menu balances student preference, commodity foods, and locally sourced foods that are fresh, fun, and encourage students to explore new flavors and new preparations. Each student has their own meal account with an assigned pin number. You can also use this account to make payments for a la carte items; checks made out to OHM BOCES Food Service, or online prepayments (ezschoolpay.com) are preferable, though cash in a labeled envelope is also an option.

Because we are operating under CEP this

year, families do not need to fill out Free/ Reduced meal applications. However, it is helpful to your school if you complete the income collection form available at ezmealapp.com. PDFs and hard copies are also available. Eligible families may qualify for benefits such as waived test fees.

While complete meals are FREE, single items like milk will still be charged to student accounts. Milk this year will be \$0.75. Other a la carte items such as frozen yogurt, baked chips, and whole grain cookies will be available for purchase most days in the school cafeterias. Prices range from \$0.75-\$2.00. There is no charging of a la carte items; meaning students must have a positive account balance, or cash in hand in order to purchase. Please sign up for an ezschoolpay.com account!! If you choose to use them for prepayment, a small fee is incurred with each transaction.
